A statewide advisory committee and three regional advisory committees guide the CFSC's activities. These groups are comprised of managers and researchers from various state and federal agencies and universities, and help the consortium staff by suggesting areas of focus as well as specific activities.

The 2012 fiscal year was productive for the consortium, with 69 research briefs, 16 webinars, 29 blog posts, and the many other activities listed above. In some areas, we have exceeded the expectations of our own plans (for instance, only 40 research briefs were planned for our first two years of operation).

Following feedback from our members and the recommendation of our advisory committee, the CFSC plans to offer more field and in-person events in 2013. We have had five successful field trips in 2012, and are looking to build on our experience from those to schedule additional trips for 2013. Tentative locations include wildfires from the 2012 season and fuels treatments in the southern Sierra Nevada and Lake Tahoe areas, among others. We are also planning regionally specific workshops throughout the state in order to both address local management issues and reduce travel distances for participants.

The use of Twitter has proved to be a good complement to our monthly newsletter, as it allows us provide more frequent updates throughout the month that our members may opt-in to receive.
